Trail Use

- Properties are open from dawn to dusk.
- Prohibited uses: motorized vehicles, overnight camping or fires. Our neighbors and the Trust do not want to put these fragile areas at risk!
- Carry out what you bring in.
- Respect the properties. Stay on the marked trails and stay off the trails that have been closed.
- Respect the boundaries of our neighbors' properties.
- Take lots of pictures, but don't pick the plants or handle the animals.
- Enjoy the views and the sounds of nature. If we treat the land well, we will be able to enjoy it for generations.
- Ticks are present. Wear sensible clothing, repellent, and check yourself carefully when exiting the land.
- Sorry, dogs are not permitted.

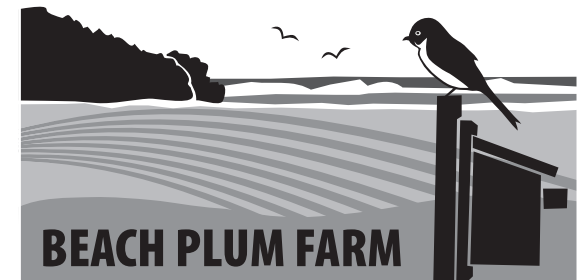

Beach Plum Farm is the last remaining salt water farm in Ogunquit and the only place you can still see the dunes and the ocean from Route One. On its 22-acre site you can see both the remnants of an old New England salt-water farm, natural landscapes and wildlife habitat.

The farm was donated to the Trust by Joe Littlefield in memory of his uncle, Roby who farmed and sold vegetables from there since the 1920's. Roby established a tradition of community garden plots which the Trust continues.

Barn #3 houses memorabilia from Roby Littlefield, who spearheaded the preservation of Ogunquit beach for public use, and served both in WW I and in the Maine Senate. Great Works Regional Land Trust offices are in the first barn. We invite you to visit us for more information on all of our conservation lands.

At the farm there is a walking loop which circles the fields and gardens, with benches along the way on which to sit and contemplate. You will see many beach plums, which are now rare in Maine, as well as bayberry and a wide variety of field grasses and flowers. Bird watchers will not be disappointed. The loop walk can be completed at a very leisurely pace in less than half-hour.

Directions: Located on the east side of Route One, 1 mile north of Ogunquit village center, directly across from Captain Thomas Road.
